Dr. Hernandez –Reif, is Professor in Human Development and Family Studies in the College of Human Ecology at the University of Alabama. She also serves as Director of the Pediatric Development Research (PDR) lab at the University of Alabama and was formerly affiliated with the Touch Research Institute at the University of Miami in the Department of Pediatrics (1998-2006). Dr. Hernandez-Reif will be sharing results of the play studies she has done there, as well as her work in the area of Touch research. Her many publications include a focus on parent-child play and interventions, as well as fetal and infant development.

Jay A. Mancini is the Haltiwanger Distinguished Professor of Human Development and Family Science at The University of Georgia. He is also Emeritus Professor of Human Development at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (Virginia Tech). From 1977 to 2009 he was on the faculty in the Department of Human Development at Virginia Tech, and was also the Senior Research Fellow at Virginia Tech's Institute for Society, Culture, and Environment. In 2013 he was the Ambiguous Loss Visiting Scholar at University of Minnesota.

Dr. Mancini's work has focused on lifespan human development, community systems, building community capacity, military family support systems, time-use and families, and psychological well-being. Throughout his career the focus has been on resilience and vulnerabilities of individuals, families, and communities, and their multiple intersections.

Dr. Mancini has published his work in periodicals such as *Journal* of Marriage and the Family, Journal of Leisure Research, Journal of Gerontology: Psychological Sciences, Journal of Gerontology: Social Sciences, Educational and Psychological Measurement, Family Science Review, Human Relations, American Journal of Orthopsychiatry, The Prevention Researcher, Journal of Community Practice, Journal of Youth and Adolescence, and Family Relations, and has contributed chapters to numerous books.




"Over the Hill and Between the Sheets: Exploring Sex in Later Life"

Erin Yelland is an assistant professor and extension specialist in adult development and aging in the School of Family Studies and Human Services in the College of Human Ecology at Kansas State University. Yelland has a bachelor's degree in youth, adult and family services from Purdue University and a doctorate in family science from the University of Kentucky. She is a Certified Family Life Educator and holds a graduate certificate in gerontology, also from the University of Kentucky. Throughout her academic career, Erin has focused on various social aspects of aging, ranging from fall prevention, embracing age and sexuality to dying, death and grief. Yelland's focused research agenda is centered on sexual expression and sexuality among older adults. Her doctoral dissertation explored public attitudes toward sex, dementia and long-term care, and she will continue this research passion by collaborating with Kansas State University's Center on Aging. Joining K-State Research and Extension also provides Yelland the exciting opportunity to translate cutting edge research on aging into helpful community programming aimed at enriching the lives of older Kansans.
